

Vincent County Council – Slaughter Houses and Inspectors – 1886-1891

- Letter from The New Zealand Police, Inspectors office, to the Chairman Vincent County Council informing him that Sergeant Shirley of Clyde is to be replaced by Sergeant William McLeod whom he recommends is appointed Inspector of Slaughterhouses for the County – 19 October 1891
- Letter from The New Zealand Police, Inspectors office, to the Chairman Vincent County Council recommending for consideration Constable James Pratt of Alexandra South as an Inspector of Slaughterhouses for Vincent County – 15 September 1881
- Petition from a group of Vincent County ratepayers to the Chairman and members of Vincent County Council (this petition is hyperlinked to the file title field for viewing) – n.d.
- Correspondence between the Clyde police station and The County Council regarding licensing issues and complaints – August-December 1887
- Letter from an Inspector of Slaughterhouses to the County Clerk, Mr Dickie, requesting a copy of the Slaughterhouse Act – 3 December 1886
- Letter from Constable Rasmussen to the Chairman Vincent County Council regarding an application for a Slaughterhouse license. He states that he does not want to sign the application and gives his reasons why. Application according to the letter accompanied it to the Council – 21 August 1886
- Letter of complaint re the slaughtering of beasts inside the town boundaries and the report from Constable Rasmussen after investigation – August 1886
- Letter from Acting Sergeant Thomas Livingstone, inspector of Slaughterhouses, to the Clerk of the Vincent County Council respectfully asking if the men noted in the margin have taken out slaughter licenses or made any attempt to take out licenses this year. If not he intends to summons them – 10 March 1886
