Key findings from research

- Recognising the importance of the freedoms that personal safety and security brings to enjoying the way of life Central Otago
- Strengthening the sense of belonging by developing welcoming, connected and supportive communities
- Protecting the health of the natural environment, for peaceful enjoyment, active recreation and as a fundamental prerequisite to high-quality productive enterprise
- Improving affordability mostly (but not wholly) as it relates to housing
- Managing growth and development in ways that are true to the community voice and values: e.g. protecting a small-town feel, providing wideopen natural spaces and enabling the pace and space that gives 'breathing room' for people
- Investing in world-class facilities and services (healthcare, education, infrastructure of all types be this roads and bridges, digital infrastructure, transport options)
- Embracing the Future while honouring Central Otago's strong roots
- Building resilience improving the sustainability of the economy, environment and society
- It also suggests a subtle but significant shift in peoples' mindsets. While continuing to show respect for traditional values, there is also an emphasis on the need for progressive thinking and becoming more future focused if the preferred way of life in Central Otago is to be sustained.

(i) Grounded in Respect for the Environment

The state of wellbeing in Central Otago is grounded in respect for and protection of the natural environment. This is the foundation upon which all else depends. While the productive capacity of the natural environment is a core driver of economic prosperity, the recreational and aesthetic value of a healthy natural environment is also valued as fundamental to well-being and the way of life in Central Otago.

(ii) Advanced by increased Economic Prosperity

An appreciation of the need to invest in growth, innovation and new technologies to enhance productivity, provide employment and sustainable business opportunities so that people can afford to live a satisfying, healthy, fulfilling life, characterised by enjoying a good work/life balance

(iii) Empowered by Social Wellbeing

Community wellbeing sits at the heart of social wellbeing in Central Otago. This is underpinned by creating a strong sense of belonging, placing a high value on feeling safe and secure and by welcoming and treating people fairly and equally. Issues around the affordability of meeting day to day living costs with access to affordable housing is highlighted. There is a strong desire to see some of these issues addressed to create vibrant and socially cohesive communities with access to world-class facilities and services - such as health, education and affordable housing choices

(iv) Enriched by Expressions of our Culture

Central Otago has a unique and vibrant culture. Creative expression is found both inside and well beyond gallery and studio walls. Cultural wellbeing is ingrained in the landscapes and how people interact with the land. It is expressed in built heritage, and traditions. It values those who have gone before, while ensuring an enriching and sustainable future for those who come next. It is the expression of who we are.



Community Outcomes

Advice from the Office of the Auditor General

- Community Outcomes are the articulation of the community's aspirations. Councils' LTPs have to describe the community outcomes they seek for the district, identify how their activities contribute to community outcomes, and identify any significant negative effects that their activities have on well-being
- **2012** amendments to the Act changed the statutory purpose of local government to require councils to focus on infrastructure, local public services, and regulatory functions in the most cost-effective manner. These amendments removed references in the Act to social, economic, environmental, and cultural well-being. However, councils still had to report on the identified effects of their activities on community well-being generally.
- **2019** amendments, returned the focus to well-being. Councils have to consider the four aspects of well-being when making decisions and planning how their activities will contribute to the desired outcomes for their communities.
- Councils also have to explain in their annual reports:
 - what they do (their groups of activities);
 - why they do them (the community outcomes to which the group of activities primarily contributes);
 - the results of any measurement of progress towards the achievement of those outcomes during the year; and
 - any identified effects that any activity within the group of activities has had on the social, economic, environmental, or cultural well-being of the community.

Working with our mana whenua partners


