I am totally opposed to the building of a Solar Farm by Helios at 48 Ranfurly-Naseby Road.

On the CODC's own website it states:" If it feels like you are driving through a painting, it is because you are. The Māniatoto is one of New Zealand's unparalleled places — a vast, soulful plain fringed by craggy, tussock-clad hills and sturdy mountain ranges. Big blue skies by day become incredible dark skies by night. Naseby residents know this for a fact – they've been taking scientific readings and their night skies are up there with the best" . How does a huge scale Solar Farm fit into this picture? If this project is allowed to go ahead it will destroy all the natural landscape the CODC is promoting.

I am also very concerned about the glare from the Solar panels and also the fire risk from so many storage batteries. It has been proven that if these batteries go on fire they are extremely difficult to extinguish.

Solar panels undamaged do not pose much of a negative impact on the environment while intact and undamged, what guarantees are there that while installing 550810 solar panels none are going to be damaged or broken during installation? With such a large number to install it would seem inevatable that some will be where damaged thus leaching toxic chemicals into the soil.

There has also no plan for what happens to the Solar Panels when the Solar Farm comes to the end of its productive life.

Currently, about 90% of end-of-life or defective solar panels also end up in landfills, largely because it costs far less to dump them than to recycle them.

Let them build their Solar Farm where the power is needed and not take advantage of a small community that will see little or no benifit from this installation.
